



The Sacagawea Heritage Trail

The Sacagawea Heritage Trail – a 23 mile, paved pedestrian and non-motorized pathway along the Columbia River—is a special project of the Tri-Cities Rivershore Enhancement Council (TREC) supported by the City of Kennewick; City of Pasco; City of Richland; Benton County; Franklin County; Port of Benton; Port of Kennewick; Port of Pasco; U.S. Army Corps of Engineers; Tri-Cities Visitor & Convention Bureau; and corporate partner, Bechtel. The Sacagawea Heritage Trail was developed to identify the area's ties to the Lewis & Clark Expedition (which visited this area in October 1805 and April 1806); provide opportunities for heritage, cultural and environmental interpretation; ensure the pursuit of safe and enjoyable shoreline recreation; and diversify the local economy through tourism. The Trail is named in honor of the Lemhi-Shoshone woman who accompanied Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark on their expedition, and served as an interpreter, guide and symbol of peace.
